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Sincerity

Sincerity is doing what is right not just on the outside, but on the inside. It is being genuinely good, all the way through. Furthermore, a sincere person does what is right not only when others are watching, but even when there is no one else around. Sincerity is doing what is right all the time in every place.

Absolute sincerity is possible only if a person is committed to keeping a clear conscience. Otherwise, there will always be hidden motives shrouded by a guilty conscience.

Do not try to be someone you are not. Clothing, make up, hair styles, and mannerisms can be used to either accent or mask who you really are.

Ways to Praise

"I appreciate your being ready for school at least 5 minutes early. That shows punctuality."

"You are responsible for keeping your room clean, and you have been very thorough and diligent in doing this job."

"Many of you may not realize all that Mary does. She not only completes her homework every evening, but she helps her family with her sick grandmother every night. She is very dependable and doesn't complain."

AVOID COMPARING PEOPLE. Do not say:

"Bill is the most sincere child I have."

"Dora is the smartest child I have ever seen."

Sincerity in the Home Includes

1. Treating family members the same at home as in public
2. Family members upholding in the home the same standards they represent to others.
3. Sons and daughters doing things of which their parents would approve, even when with friends.
4. Family members discussing people as if those people were present

Rewards of Sincerity

HONOR - To the same degree that people despise hypocrites they honor those who are sincere and have integrity.

TRUST - When people see that our motives are transparent and that we have a sincere desire to do what is right, they will put great trust in what we think and say.

Praising Character vs. Achievement

Consider the following maxim:

The Value of Starting Early - "It is easier to train an infant than to discipline a child. It is easier to discipline a child than to restrain a teenager. It is easier to restrain a teenager than to reform an adult. It is easier to reform an adult than to salvage a society."

Praising children for character while they are young pays great dividends as they grow older, not only in the good it does, but also in the wrong it prevents.
